# Significant State Funding Approved for Local Transportation Projects Zach Friend Second District Supervisor


In early December, the California
Transportation Commission granted over
\$107 million in funding for multi-modal
improvements to our local transportation
network. This grant application from our
local Regional Transportation Commission

(RTC) benefitted from California Senate Bill 1: the Solutions for Congested Corridors Program and Local Partnership Competitive Program. Our competitiveness for these programs was due in large part to our passage of Measure D, which provides a local match for these major transportation projects.

The funding addresses a number of challenges that are particularly acute in the mid and south county areas including Highway 1 congestion, that many of you know, impacts everyone, including those simply trying to get to work or back home, emergency vehicles, buses, and delivery vehicles. The second issue is cut-through traffic. As a result of the highway congestion, many vehicles exit the highway and create safety issues for drivers, cyclists and pedestrians in Seacliff and other areas. The third is bike and pedestrian safety. Our area is the fifth worst in the state for bike collisions and improvements to bike and pedestrian safety are essential.


#### What will be funded?

Three new sets of auxiliary lanes on Highway 1 between Soquel Drive and State Park Drive.
 Additionally, the first 5.75-miles of a 7.5-mile hybrid bus-on-shoulder/auxiliary lane facility, where transit buses can travel in the auxiliary lane and on the shoulders to bypass traffic.

Two new Highway 1 bicycle/pedestrian overcrossings, including the long-awaited Mar Vista
Drive project. A bridge replacement at Capitola Avenue, with new pedestrian and bike facilities
is also included in the funding.



 Lastly, a significant improvement on Soquel Drive including five miles of buffered/protected bicycle lanes, forty-six green bike boxes for left turn movements, new sidewalks to connect to existing sidewalk facilities, ADA improvements, 96 crosswalk upgrades, crosswalk warning devices at 10mid block locations, and adaptive traffic signal control prioritizing transit at twenty-three intersections to improve bus transit time.

The benefits of funding these projects are increased safety and reduced transportation times on this congested corridor with an innovative package of projects to improve and integrate transportation on both the highway and local roadways.

Buses can bypass traffic at intersections by traveling on the new Highway 1 shoulder and can, with signal prioritization, travel more efficiently on Soquel Drive. Safe routes to school will expand with new buffered bike lanes and new sidewalks and crosswalk improvements on Soquel Drive. The two new bike and pedestrian overcrossings will connect neighborhoods to new, safer bike and pedestrian routes. The highway improvements will mean less cut through traffic on side streets improving neighborhood safety and relieving congestion on Soquel Drive.

The RTC is partnering with Caltrans, METRO, and the County on these projects. The County will be the lead agency for the multimodal improvements on Soquel Drive. The Highway 1 improvements will be constructed by Caltrans with the RTC implementing environmental clearance and final design. The RTC anticipates that all components of this extensive project will be under construction by 2023 with some beginning even before then.

# Along the Moosehead Trail

During the last three months, the repair of the Moosehead Trail connecting East Seacliff Drive, near the Seacliff Mini Park, to the Aptos Creek footbridge has progressed steadily and is mostly complete. It was a real team effort. Our work party included board members David Somerton, Dennis Doo and Will Roblin, Seacliff residents Peter Smithey and Paul Vitali, and State Park Maintenance Chief Augie Ceballos and four members of his staff.

Two main workdays focused on replacing rotten stairs and adding additional ones to improve safety. On subsequent workdays the sections of the trail between each stair were both graded and widened. Fallen trees were cut back and a slide barrier was installed near the hairpin bend.

Trail walkers including seniors and families with young children have commented that the stairs are now safer and more easily negotiated with the improvements.

# Every Day is Pedestrian Safety Day in Seacliff Rebecca Downing

A lot has changed since our Pedestrian Stroll to Aptos Village in the Summer of 2019. We are all strolling a LOT more around Seacliff! Other county residents are walking Seacliff streets too, so the association has been focusing our efforts right here in our neighborhood to help everyone.



As soon as we learned, in 2018, the streets to be included in the Measure D paving work, the Seacliff Pedestrian Safety Committee reviewed the area and made pedestrian safety recommendations to the County Public Works Department that were





incorporated into the project. After the work was completed, the roads were much smoother, and speeds increased on all the newly paved streets. With help from Patrick Mulhearn of Supervisor Friend's office, the association posted sixteen pedestrian safety signs on some of our busier streets and at dangerous intersections. We plan to rotate signs to other locations so let us know of any areas needing attention.

A flashing crosswalk sign was also installed on Center Avenue near the Metro bus stop so please yield to pedestrians in this and every crosswalk.

To assist our local cyclists with safety, bike lights were given to residents who needed them at the Seacliff Village Park by Bike Santa Cruz County as part of their public outreach efforts on December 21st. This organization advocates for better cycling policies in countywide planning and transportation projects to create a more bike-friendly and healthier community. #### Be the Difference

Even though the Covid-19 pandemic has altered where and how we play in our local parks, Supervisor Zach Friend has been steadily at work with the County Parks Department and the non-profit Friends of County Parks to ensure the forward progress of our neighborhood's long planned Seacliff Village County Park.

The skate-site, for example, opened early in the year and quickly became a popular, outdoor location for kids and adults of all ages and abilities to skate and scoot along the concrete wave.

Also, Before Covid-19 stymied aggressive fundraising, the Friends of County Parks partnered with the generous Strock family and launched a \$1 to \$1 fundraising campaign that netted around \$30,000.

A bulbous thermometer will remain in the park to remind us that while 73% of the park has been built, we need to raise approximately \$775,000 to complete the park's Master Plan Phase II and includes a corner amphitheater, shade structure, improved ADA walkways and landscaping.
