Soquel Drive Corridor and Highway Work Underway - and Update on Seacliff

Work is beginning on the largest investment in improvements on Soquel Drive in decades. The Soquel Drive Buffered Bike Lane and Congestion Mitigation Project began this month and will continue until next winter. The project is part of a larger set of traffic and transportation improvements planned along Highway 1 and the

Soquel Drive corridor between State Park Drive and La Fonda Avenue with major investments for mid and south county. The funding comes from an over \$100 million grant from the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for muti-modal improvements to our local transportation network. The funding was awarded from a grant application from the local Regional Transportation Commission (RTC) and is a result of funding from Senate Bill 1: the Solutions for Congested Corridors Program and Local Partnership Competitive Program. Our county's competitiveness for these programs was due in large part to our passage of Measure D in 2016, which provides a local match for these major transportation projects.

The funding works to address a number of issues that are particularly acute in the mid and south county areas. First, Highway 1 congestion. Congestion on the highway impacts everyone including those simply trying to get to work or return home, emergency vehicles, buses and delivery vehicles. The second issue is cut-through traffic. As a result of the highway congestion, many vehicles exit the highway and create safety issues on local side streets. The third issue is bike and pedestrian safety. Our area is the fifth worst in the state for bike collisions so there is a need for better bike and pedestrian safety facilities, and the increased vehicle usage of Soquel Drive and other side streets is a contributing factor to these increased collisions.

Significant improvements on Soquel Drive, include 5 miles of buffered, protected bicycle lanes, 46 green bike boxes for left turn movements, new sidewalks that connect to existing sidewalk facilities, ADA improvements, 96 crosswalk upgrades, crosswalk warning devices at 10-mid block locations. Installation of adaptive traffic signal control with transit prioritization at 23 intersections will improve bus transit time.

Many of these were requested by the community to improve access to local schools and major job centers. For example, near Mar Vista Elementary and Cabrillo College, new buffered bike lanes and sidewalks are planned that will connect to existing sidewalks and improve pedestrian access to schools. The project will also improve drainage and add retaining walls and/or hardscape where required to improve safety in the area.

The Soquel Drive project will require some lane closures between 8:30 am-4:30 pm in the specific area the crews are

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working at that time. While this will create some delays in the specific construction areas, the improvements will be significant for our community once completed. This project will harmonize with work currently underway on Highway 1 that will bring three new sets of auxiliary lanes between Soquel Drive and State Park Drive. The first phase of that work, between Soquel and 41st Avenue, is currently underway. This will create the first 5.75-miles of a 7.5-mile hybrid bus-on-shoulder/auxiliary lane facility so transit buses can travel in the auxiliary lane between intersections and on the shoulders at intersections to bypass traffic improving transit travel times.

Two new Highway 1 bicycle/pedestrian overcrossings at Chanticleer Avenue and the longawaited Mar Vista Drive project, are also part of the on-going work with Chanticleer's bridge part of this first phase. Measure D Update

As you may have noticed, a number of roads have been paved in Seacliff this summer as a result of Measure D road funding. In a previous column I mentioned that next year the west side of Mar Vista in Seacliff would be paved. Unfortunately, that work will need to be postponed.

The Santa Cruz County Sanitation District discovered some pipes that need replacing on some of the same streets where Measure D work was planned for next summer. As a result, sanitation work will be performed and, after the pipes are replaced, Measure D road work will be scheduled. It is currently anticipated that pipe work will occur in 2024 and the Measure D road work will occur in 2025, one year later than is scheduled.

312 Park Avenue

The yard in front of Jeff and Susan Hartman's home was almost completely covered in concrete when they purchased it in 2020. A full makeover of the front yard was undertaken to retain the driveway, remove the paving, and create a beautiful mosaic of river pebbles with an inviting seating area surrounded by an impressive variety of plants.

Susan likes the highly dense English Cottage style garden and experiments with different plants to render a layered, lived in feel.

They worked with Black Diamond for their hardscaping, and Dig Gardens, Sierra Azul and Far West to select a variety of different plants. In addition to the visual appeal, Susan said she wanted a garden that would attract birds and bees.

118 Santa Cruz

There are more to the clean modern lines of Jennifer Klein's home than meets the eye. Viewed from the street, her property has been transformed from a traditional ranch house with a front yard filled with crushed lava rock to a beautifully updated home with an attractive garden, a new deck and pathway. Collaborating with her on the redesign was Greg Stephen of 180 Builders and Darryl Kool of Kool Landscaping. Jennifer worked with Dig Gardens to complete her landscape vision for this home.

Jennifer is an artist and the garden sculpture in front is only a hint of the artistic flare throughout



her home. She purchased the property 2 years ago and splits her time between Napa and Seacliff. She developed her love of gardening through her mother's garden and working with her grandmother in her orchards in Almaden.

This makes sense since Ronie is a retired botanist, having worked for both the National and State Park systems in places like Point Reyes and the Channel Islands.

The landscape design was her own, consisting primarily of native plants and large field stone boulders with salvaged architectural elements such as her vintage gates from Mexico City. Ronie worked with Jay Welty for the hardscape and new wood fencing, and Jeff at Sierra Azul Nursery helped source plants.

Seacliff State Beach News

Members of our board of directors met in August with the two primary organizations responsible for managing both operations and the design and installation of the new visitor amenities at the beach to address future sea level rise and climate resiliency.

Our meeting with Scott Rohlf, Associate Park and Recreation Specialist for California State Parks' Santa Cruz District, included a discussion about the timeline, design review and public participation for the climate resilient infrastructure and features planned for the areas damaged and destroyed in the winter storms. Our board members described how important it will be for local residents to participate in the rebuilding and were assured that public outreach will be robust and inclusive. In addition to climate resiliency, construction of public areas will be updated to include better facilities for those with limited mobility so they may reach the beach with improved accessibility.

Many of the park operations are actually the work of Friends of State Parks, our local non-profit caring for over 34 coastal state parks in both Santa Cruz and San Mateo counties. Over 100 employees work on education and interpretation, school field trips and teacher resources, park operations, accessibility, volunteers, preservation and capital projects, staffing entrance kiosks, managing the gift stores, and funding efforts for all the parks in our district.

As an integral part of the rebuilding of the beach area, Friends will be conducting outreach including an upcoming survey, hosting the Seacliff Recovery Fund, currently at over \$80,000, and providing whatever support is needed by state park staff for this work.

Friends is hosting an "Outdoor Movie Night featuring Muppet Treasure Island!" on Saturday, September 16, 2023, from 6 PM - 10 PM, by the ramada area next to the Seacliff Visitor Center. Before the movie starts, there will be crafts, games and a presentation by AquaSmart Live, an award-winning performance designed to teach children how to stay safe in and around California waterways. And of course, what's a movie night without popcorn and snacks? There will also be a concession stand with all your favorites, so you can munch away on delicious snacks while enjoying the film.
