Artificial Intelligence
Use Policy for
County Employees

A few months ago, the Board of Supervisors unanimously supported an employee policy governing use of artificial intelligence (AI) systems based on an item I brought forward to create and implement an adaptable policy for the responsible and ethical use of AI systems by County employees. The goal is to build

frameworks around issues such as data privacy, cybersecurity, bias, and transparency, recognizing these tools are both here to stay and important elements of improving customer service. In essence, not to stifle innovation or Al's usage but to consider both the opportunities and risks posed by this new technology. Our county is the first in the country to create such a policy, and in just a few short months this has become a model at both the state and national level.

The policy emphasizes security, fairness, transparency, and continual learning in the use of rapidly evolving AI technologies and outlines principles and protocols for the responsible and ethical use of generative AI tools by County employees, contractors, and third parties. My focus was to create a values-based policy rather than an overly prescriptive one. Here are some elements:

- Data Privacy and Security: Comply with all data privacy and security standards to protect Personally Identifiable Information (PII), Protected Health Information (PHI), or any sensitive data in generative AI prompts.
- Informed Consent: Members of the public should be informed when they are interacting with an AI tool and have an "opt out" alternative to using AI tools available.
- Responsible Use: Al tools and systems shall only be used in an ethical manner.
- Continuous Learning: When County provided AI training becomes available, employees should participate to ensure appropriate use of AI, data handling, and adherence to County policies on a continuing basis.
- Avoiding Bias: Al tools can create biased outputs. When using Al tools, develop Al usage
 practices that minimize bias and regularly review outputs to ensure fairness and accuracy,
 as you do for all content.
- Decision Making: Do not use Al tools to make impactful decisions. Be conscientious about how Al tools are used to inform decision making processes.
- Accuracy: Al tools can generate inaccurate and false information. Take time to review and verify Al-generated content to ensure quality, accuracy, and compliance with County guidelines and policies.
- Transparency: The use of AI systems should be explainable to those who use and are affected by their use.
- Accountability: Employees are solely responsible for ensuring the quality, accuracy, and regulatory compliance of all Al generated content utilized in the scope of employment.

Seacliff State Beach News

Our coastal area including Seacliff and New Brighton State Beaches experienced another high wave event on December 28th, 2023. While less severe than the January 2023 event that had breaking wave heights between 20-30 feet, it was no less meaningful, with waves easily overtopping Seacliff's seawall and inundating roads and facilities below the bluffs.

The seawall on the day-use side experienced three new failures, causing loss of aggregate material and buckling of asphalt. These areas were quickly stabilized with material State Parks already had on hand. Recently, the day-use area was closed to aid in the clearing of sand deposited during the December waves. We will continue to implement public safety measures, such as metal barriers around hazardous areas in the day-use as conditions allow. There will be signage at beach stairs alerting visitors to the conditions, but due to the exposure of beach stairs to potential winter storm wave energy, handrails will likely not be installed until spring. The campground saw more aggregate loss that seemed to spread sideways behind intact portions of seawall. The Seacliff campground will continue to have closed area signage on sandwich boards alerting visitors to stay out of the damaged areas around the seawall. Please stay away from any areas of damage and follow the directions of State Park personnel.

Turning now to the ongoing Recovery and Resilience of Seacliff and New Brighton State Beaches project. In September and October of 2023, we conducted a visitor experience survey for both park units; the response was tremendous. We received 3,855 survey responses from all over the state: north to Siskiyou County, south to San Diego County, and all the way east to Tahoe. What were the top three responses heard? People overwhelmingly stated Seacliff's beauty is what they valued most. This was followed by the physical and mental benefits of visiting, and the activities one can engage in while at the park. Your feedback through surveys like this helps State Parks plan for a future that addresses the effects of sea level rise while continuing to support what our visitors value.

Moving into spring, State Parks will be starting a second push for public outreach and engagement focused on results of the vulnerability study and adaptation pathway alternatives, which are in development now. Future opportunities to be involved include a public workshop (details TBA), another survey, community and on-site tabling, and more. You can join our email list to sign up for project updates. County Conducting Sea Level Rise Vulnerability Assessment

We have witnessed firsthand just how powerful the Pacific Ocean can be, leaving its mark on our coastal communities. It is a stark reminder of the impact nature can have on our lives. Instances of destructive storm events are not isolated events – they are part of a pattern that is expected to intensify in the upcoming years and decades. Climate change and rising seas will exacerbate coastal hazards including flooding, bluff erosion, beach loss, and damage to homes and critical public infrastructure. To prepare for the future of our coast and adapt to the changes ahead, the County is conducting a sea level rise vulnerability assessment funded by a \$780,000 grant from the California Coastal Commission. As some community members might be aware, the County has been working on this issue with the Coastal Commission for several years.

The current project will involve technical analyses related to coastal hazard vulnerabilities, economics, and adaptation planning for the unincorporated Santa Cruz County coastline. The project will analyze adaptation approaches at the countywide and neighborhood scale, including phased adaptation pathways. The phased adaptation pathways involve analyzing planned steps and approaches that unfold over time to enhance resilience and address specific challenges along the way.

A robust community outreach effort will involve stakeholders including property owners, neighborhood groups, environmental non-profits, community-based organizations, businesses and representatives, surfers and ocean recreation participants, design and technical professionals. The outreach plan will include efforts to ensure participation by low-income, Indigenous, communities of color, and marginalized communities. The outreach plan will involve interviews, small to large group meetings, online workshops and tools, with outreach materials in English and Spanish to ensure the project is inclusive, equitable and reflects the needs of all members of the community.

Based on the technical information and community input, a range of adaptation options will be analyzed and considered for each neighborhood, Seacliff, for example, and the County as a whole. The final phase of the project will include recommendations for policy and code updates that will be incorporated into an update of the County's Local Coastal Plan (LCP) related to coastal hazards. The LCP update will be submitted to the Board of Supervisors for local approval and then to the California Coastal Commission for final approval.

The project kicked off on January 30, 2024, when the Board of Supervisors approved a contract for a consultant team to perform the study. After an initial period of information gathering and assessment, outreach to the community, including the Seacliff Improvement Association and other community stakeholders, will begin.

Around Seacliff This Winter

In addition to the official entrances to Seacliff State Beach, there are two popular neighborhood beach trails in Seacliff. The Moosehead Trail, located next to 163 Seacliff Drive, connects Seacliff to Rio Del Mar near Aptos Creek, and the Beachgate Trail begins at the intersection of Beachgate Way and Coates Drive leading to Seacliff State Beach. In our Fall 2023 newsletter, Jordan Burgess, Deputy District Superintendent for the Santa Cruz District of California State Parks wrote about how specific trail work on the Moosehead and Beachgate trails was being performed by Santa Cruz Mountains Trail Stewardship: SCMTS in partnership with the Friends of Santa Cruz State Parks Friends.





Although it has rained quite a bit since this work was completed, the trails are holding. There is a small slide on the Beachgate Trail that we have requested State Parks to clear because it is on State Park property. For general pruning and maintenance on the upper section of the Beachgate Trail, GreenOuse Landscaping, our Seacliff Mini Park landscaper, visits monthly to keep the Beachgate trail open. Your dues and past donations to the Beachgate Trail funds this regular maintenance to keep a clear path on the county portion of this trail that has been around since 1925! Neighbor Steve Periera, our longtime Beachgate Trail caretaker, generously tackles the leaves on the top part of the Beachgate trail as needed. Thank you, Steve!

The Seacliff Mini Park, located along the edge of Seacliff Drive continues to be THE spot for watching all the action from surf and beach conditions to swells and storms. GreenOuse Landscaping visits twice each month to prune and weed and neighbors volunteer to remove trash and keep it tidy. You may notice something new this year... we are poppy bombing! GreenOuse owner, Michelle Ouse, along with association volunteers have been sowing poppy seeds throughout the park to beautify the open areas and encourage visitors to stay back from the cliff edge.



We hope these add a bright and cheerful complement to our colorful Ceanothus blossoms this spring. At the other end of the block, neighbors planted Fortnight Lilies, also found at the Mini Park, along the sidewalk to beautify the bluff near the County Park Commemorative Bench that provides a front row view of the bay. Please give these new plants a chance to grow and show us their beauty by staying on the paths and sidewalk.
