Vacation Rental Survey Results and What Comes Next

In light of the increased attention surrounding

vacation rentals, the association recently asked our members how vacation rentals affect our community. Although the association is not taking a position on any potential new county ordinances, we are sharing information from the survey with the county because we do see a need to further address this issue.

Survey Highlights:

- Over 30thirty percent of our members took the survey which shows there is a lot of interest in the issue
- Sixty-two percent of those who responded live on streets with vacation rentals
- Nine percent of respondents own vacation homes and do not want more regulation
- Eighty-three percent of those who took the survey have previously contacted vacation renters regarding noise, parties, parking, trespassing and/or garbage problems
- Sixty percent of respondents took extra time to provide comments about their experiences and opinions
- Sixty-one percent of respondents have concerns about purchasing a home next to a vacation rental

Robin Musitelli, assistant to Supervisor Ellen Pirie, reports that after receiving many complaints about overcrowded houses, noisy parties, illegal remodels and excessive vehicles at single family homes converted to vacation rentals, the Board of Supervisors decided that it was time to act. The

Board's concerns are that neighborhoods will suffer from a proliferation of vacation rental homes and that owners of such homes do not always consider the impact their guests will have on their neighbors.

Turning a single family home into something akin to a small hotel is a change in use that can impact a neighborhood in a negative way, if not carefully managed. While many vacation rental owners do manage their rentals well, others are not considerate of neighbors, are openly hostile or fail to pay the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) that is required of all vacation rentals.

Supervisor Pirie believes that the minimum essentials to be addressed, which are similar to what Capitola and other cities have, by the ordinance are:

- 1) Registration and permitting of vacation rental homes
- 2) Local management and/or a local contact who will respond to problems
- 3) A process for hearing complaints and revoking the permit if necessary

Residents of Seacliff understand that we live in a vacation destination and expect some who rent vacation homes to enjoy themselves beyond the limits of the law. And, because some vacation rental issues can be the same as regular rentals, it is important to educate ourselves about existing laws and regulations to give everyone the tools for promoting a common understanding of managing rental properties.

The proposed vacation rental ordinance is currently undergoing environmental review and can be viewed at:

Rental Home Tips from Sergeant Mitchell

If residents have issues with rentals that involve noise and/or alcohol, County Code Chapters 8.30 and 8.32, can be enforced by a call to the County Sheriff.

Code 8.30 refers to offensive noise which disturbs a person and is not permitted between 10 p.m. and 8 a.m.

Count Code 8.32 covers loud and unruly gatherings and the serving of alcohol to minors.

Calls for illegally parked cars may be directed to the 24-hour California Highway Patrol, non-emergency number: 796-2160.

Help Seacliff Prepare for the next Emergency

Local government prepares for everyday emergencies. However, during a disaster, the number and scope of incidents can overwhelm conventional emergency services. The Community Emergency Response Team

(CERT) is a positive and realistic approach to emergency and disaster situations. Where one may initially be on their own, their actions can make a difference. While people will respond to others in need without the training, one goal of the CERT program is to help them do so effectively and efficiently without placing themselves in unnecessary danger. The program is an all-risk, all-hazard training and a valuable course designed to help you protect yourself, your family, and your Seacliff neighbors in an emergency situation. In the CERT training, you learn to:

- * Manage utilities and put out small fires
- * Treat the three medical killers by opening airways
- * Controlling bleeding, and treating for shock
- * Provide basic medical aid
- * Search for and rescue victims safely
- * Organize themselves and spontaneous new volunteers to be more effective in a disaster
- * Collect disaster intelligence to support first responder efforts

It's like paying for car insurance. You might never need either; you'd hope not to. But if needed, having the CERT training means that you're as ready as you can be to help yourself, your family and your neighborhood. The next Training class starts Feb 1st and runs for 6 weeks. Next Steps for Poor Clares

When the California Coastal Commission recommended that Santa Cruz County rescind its request for rezoning the Poor Clares property, present home of the Coastlands Church, it also asked the county to create a plan for the entire property, not just the four acres the county rezoned for 100 high density housing units. So, the county directed the planning department to develop a work program to accomplish this and at the December 14th Board of Supervisors Meeting, the board voted to adopt it.

Something new in the works is to include Poor Clares in a Soquel Drive Corridor Study. Here are some highlights from the program including details about the study:

- The Study will focus on the 7-mile Soquel Drive Corridor and nearby opportunity sites for economic development and workforce housing, including the Poor Clares site.
- The planning process outlined in that scope of work will begin with a study to define and characterize market area conditions and evaluate economic development constraints and opportunities. The County is also preparing to carry out a market study for lodging/visitor accommodations.
- The planning process is anticipated to kick off in June 2011 and conclude in November 2013 with

recommendations, which would then be evaluated prior to being considered for adoption.

- Planning staff will develop a master land use plan for the Poor Clares site to be carried out in conjunction with the corridor study with the expectation that the property owner will submit an application to the County for a General Plan/Local Coastal Program amendment.
- The amendment will then be reviewed under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and that after County action on that application an LCP Amendment would be filed for consideration to the Coastal Commission.
- An assessment of the General Plan and Local Coastal Program to address Priority Land Use policy language will also be conducted by staff who will return to the Board in Fall 2011 for additional Board direction regarding a possible General Plan and Local Coastal Program Amendment.

Heavy Equipment Visits Seacliff State Beach

If you have been down to the beach lately, you probably noticed a lot of construction. Although the state budget is very tight and only critical repairs are being conducted, several projects are being tackled during the quieter winter months including:

Installation of the new sewer line has been restarted after a break for the busy summer season. The day-use section of the beach is off limits to vehicles while trenches are dug and pipes are installed.

The Visitor Center will have a new entrance deck and parking to meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

Additionally, parking and ADA access in the upper parking lot is being upgraded with new parking pads and ramps.
