Roads and
Revenue

While we've had some recent success with road repairs in Seacliff, including McGregor, Mar Vista and the upcoming State Park Drive improvements, there is no question that many residential streets (including mine!) throughout our neighborhood are in need of repair. State and

federal road funds for county roads are limited to arterial roads, such as Soquel Drive, and are coupled with a local funding structure that provides a significantly lower percentage of tax proceeds to our county than neighboring counties. And now the big hit - because of large declines in gas tax revenues, due to lower pump prices and higher fuel efficiency, the likelihood of funding purely for residential streets is lower than it should be.

The County maintains over 600 miles of roads with over 200 miles located in our district alone - everything from the summit to Corralitos to residential roads in Seacliff. It's a massive amount of roads, bridges, culverts and more to maintain, especially with our current tax structure. The County recently completed an analysis of our local roads and found on a scale of zero (a failed road) to 100 (new road) the average Pavement Condition Index of Santa Cruz County roads is 57. This means that our roads are generally defined as being in "poor condition" by this measurement index. So where do your taxes go if not for roads?

The county has a different funding structure than cities. Over half of the county's revenues come from the state and federal government. These funds are generally pass-through funds to provide mandated services such as health or jail programs. These funds are restricted in their use and generally can't be used for local road repairs. Approximately 22 percent of the county revenue comes from local taxes. These taxes include property taxes, vehicle license fees, taxes paid at local hotels and sales taxes. While property taxes make up about half of that 22 percent, only 13 cents of every property tax dollar goes to the County.

So where does the rest of your property tax go to? The largest share, about 57%, goes to schools while another 18% goes to local special districts, cities and the libraries. Why does such a small amount stay with the county? The distribution is determined based on what our county was collecting the year before Proposition 13 was passed. This means that some counties, such as Santa Clara and San Mateo, keep between 2 and 4 times what we can keep. This is due to the fact that in 1978 their county was keeping more tax revenue for county government and distributing less to other entities. Imagine the possibilities if we could simply keep more of the taxes locally that we are assessed. Unfortunately, this would require modification to Propostiton13 to even become a possibility.

What about CSA 9D (the road assessment) on our property taxes? This assessment generates \$2.7 million annually. With over 600 miles of roads to maintain and over \$80 million in deferred maintenance, the \$2.7 million spread from Boulder Creek to Corralitos doesn't come close to meeting our road funding needs.

One way we can improve our situation would be state relief for more equitable distribution of property taxes. Simply put, we could do a lot more for roads if county government could keep more than 13 cents of your property tax dollar. Secondly, less reliance on the gas tax or a better mechanism than the gas tax (which is a large local road funding stream) would be welcome.

Some neighborhoods have also successfully created road associations or County Service Areas (CSA) that raise funds to build, maintain and repair roads specific to that neighborhood. ### Seacliff Village Park News

The progress of "Seacliff Village Park" continues to move forward. Late last year, the Board of Supervisors approved the Master Site Plan and coastal development permits for Seacliff's first neighborhood park.

Phase I improvements of the 1.25-acre County park site at the corner of Searidge Road and McGregor Drive include grading for drainage and infrastructure, a new walkway along McGregor Drive, walkways throughout the park, a play area, a picnic area, parking and drought-tolerant landscaping. It's anticipated that construction of this long-awaited park is likely to start in June.


If you plan to attend the membership meeting at The MED next month, check out the CERT Team Seacliff map outside. Locate your Division and learn the name and possibly meet your CERT neighborhood Leader. During a disaster, if you need help or want to provide help, they are the one to contact.

The Community Emergency Response Team Program is designed to help communities prepare for effective disaster response through training and pre-planning. The training covers basic skills that are important to know when emergency services may not be immediately available. Program material covers earthquakes, fires, floods, hazardous incidents and other general life threatening situations.

## Seacliff Final Easement and Undergrounding Update Will Roblin

The Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors approved lease agreements between the County and the California Department of State Parks for streetscape improvements on two small lots on the east side of State Park Drive just south of Center Avenue, often referred to as "the triangle and the dirt lot." This agreement is an important step in the progress of the now decades-long downtown Seacliff streetscape improvement project.

Construction will follow the utility undergrounding project that includes placement of twelve telephone poles downtown. Final modifications of streetlight placement assignment are almost complete so AT&T, the lead utility, can then put the project out to bid again with current, revised undergrounding plans. Selection of a successful bid should set the wheels in motion for actual construction although there is no scheduled start date at this time.



### Seacliff Improvement Association Proposed Amendments to our By-laws

To keep up with advances in technology and increased cost of everything, the Seacliff Improvement Association Board of Directors is recommending two changes to our by-laws. The first change will allow us to notify members electronically or by telephone of upcoming meetings and membership votes. Currently, notification can only be done via U.S. Mail. The second amendment allows the board to spend up to \$1,500 on a single expense. The current amount is \$1,000.

### Seacliff Improvement Association By-law Amendment Ballot

ARTICLE IV, SECTION 6. Notice of Meetings.

Written [N]otice of annual, quarterly, or special meetings shall be given to all members in good standing at least 10 days prior to that meeting. Such notices shall contain a statement of the place, date, and hour, and the purpose of such meeting, and shall be deemed proper if [sent electronically or, in the case of members who do not use e-mail,] deposited in the U.S. Mail, postage prepaid and addressed to the member at the last address furnished by that member [or by telephone call].

ARTICLE V, SECTION 2. Limitations of Directors. Individual Directors are not empowered to take public stands on community issues proclaiming representation of the Association's Board of Directors unless prior concurrence has been agreed upon by a majority vote of the Board of Directors. Before the expenditure of corporate funds or the incurring of any obligation in excess of \$1,000.00 [\$1,500.00] in any single transaction shall be valid; such action of the Board must be approved by a majority vote at a general membership meeting.
