Encouraging Alternative Energy Options Zach Friend Second District Supervisor County of Santa Cruz

The Board of Supervisors has been working on ways to encourage alternative energy options in our community. This includes exploring Community Choice Aggregation (where cities and counties can pool their residential, business and municipal electricity loads and purchase and

generate power on their behalf), as well looking for ways to encourage the installation of solar photovoltaic residential systems (solar power systems).

Improving Solar Options

A number of community members provided feedback that the County's solar permit fees were higher than some other local jurisdictions, which provided a disincentive for solar photovoltaic installation.

In December, the Board of Supervisors directed Planning staff to return with a permit fee that would be more in line and competitive with other jurisdictions. At a recent meeting, the Board of Supervisors received a report on ways that the fee could be reduced through greater efficiency of Planning Department processes such as: development of standard solar photovoltaic plans for use at the counter or online application submittals and a dedicated online email for solar permit application submittals. Additionally, the County Planning Department reviewed their inspection requirements to ensure the process was as efficient as possible while still remaining compliant with state mandates.

The end result was very positive. The Board of Supervisors approved a 50% reduction in solar photovoltaic residential system permit fees - lowering them to a flat fee of \$250. While this doesn't fully recover inspection and processing costs, the proposed fee is comparable to solar credits given by other jurisdictions and other jurisdictional permit fees.

Providing Our Own Power

The County has been a major partner in researching the feasibility of Community Choice Aggregation and, if so, what the options are for implementation. One of the potential advantages of Community Choice Aggregation is that it puts control of energy purchasing and pricing into local hands, and allows the community to determine what type of energy mix best serves their needs. This includes the possibility of using more renewable energy options.

Seacliff Infrastructure Update

Part of our association's mission is to improve our infrastructure by advocating for public works projects in Seacliff. This important work is ongoing and often the product of our effort doesn't arrive until those who initiated the endeavor have retired from our board of directors, moved or passed away. The pace of these improvements have been almost glacial at times due to budget constraints and staffing levels, the order in which the projects must be completed, and the willingness of public and private entities to cooperate. Members of this association continue to work through these issues for our neighborhood to bring these much-anticipated improvements to Seacliff. Following is a brief update of current projects except for Seacliff Village Park that is mentioned in the next article:

Undergrounding of Utility Poles in Downtown Seacliff:

Good things come to those who wait? Because this project has been delayed for so many years, a 4TB fiber trunk will now be included in the project allowing any internet company to provide very-high-speed broadband to the Seacliff. Cruzio is particularly interested in offering gigabit-speed home internet products, and it is also expected that AT&T and Comcast will make their gigabit products available to the community at some point in the future.

From Patrick Mulhearn, Analyst in Supervisor Friend's office, we just learned that PG&E policy requires a 3 foot separation between their facilities and so-called "wet" utilities. Since the current design shows a 1.9 foot separation at one point, the county's design consultants are reviewing their records from a previous project to determine if the exact locations of utilities in the ground are noted. PG&E's policy allows for a variance with administrative approval as long as the separation is no less than 1', so it has been recommended, as a precaution, they submit an internal request for a variance. Once this is resolved, the project can continue. Upon its completion, the County's Seacliff Village Streetscape Beautification project can commence.

Mar Vista Pedestrian Bridge over Highway 1:

According to the Santa Cruz County Regional Transportation District(RTC) Executive Director, George Dondero, RTC staff will soon be requesting project proposals from consultants and expect a selection to be made this spring. In the summer there will be workshops to gather information and take comments from the public. The association will email notices of public meetings so our members can participate. According to the RTC, the ongoing funding crisis for transportation at the statewide level continues to affect many projects and could incur delays on this one since it is not yet fully funded.

Seacliff Roads:

According to Supervisor Friend, over 200 potholes were filled by County Public Works last week in Seacliff because of requests from his office and the Citizen Connect App (see page 6) requests they have been receiving from us! You may have also noticed some new high visibility street signs like the ones at Seacliff and Mar Vista Drives. Keep reporting those potholes, abandoned cars and graffiti to keep Seacliff safe and beautiful!

Seacliff Village Park Opens

Seacliff has its neighborhood park and it is a lot of fun! On December 10, 2015, the winter rains paused long enough for the grand opening of the long anticipated Seacliff Village Park located at the corner of Sea Ridge Road and McGregor Drive. Neither rain nor ceremony hindered the



happily impatient neighborhood children and hours before the official ceremony, the new playground was filled with squeals and laughter as children and parents explored the Lighthouse motif climbing structure and swings.

While neighbors who have been instrumental in the acquisition of the parkland and the creation of the Seacliff Village Park Master Plan reminisced as they examined a display of photos and memorabilia, County Parks staff graciously poured juice and coffee and circulated trays of finger foods donated by Manuel's Restaurant and Severino's.

Before the ribbon cutting ceremony, a range of people instrumental to the park's creation included County Supervisor Zach Friend, holding his 1-year old son, Elliott; Jeff Gaffney, Director of County Parks, Open Space and Cultural Services; Will Roblin, President of the Seacliff Improvement Association; Tom Dobrovolny, representing Seacliff Needs a Park, Inc.; and, County park project manager, Sheryl Bailey. Happy cheers and applause rose from the attendees as Seacliff Village activist Pepper Golesh wielding the over-sized wood scissors, provided by Karen and John Hibble from the Aptos Chamber of Commerce, snipped apart the ceremonial red ribbon, officially opening Seacliff Village Park.

Recently the mosaics were vandalized and the County Parks Department is in discussion with the artist about the extent of the damage and how to best repair the artwork. Upcoming additions to park will be the installation of three memorial benches and educational signage identifying the park's bio-swale and drought tolerant landscaping.

Of all the truths in the world, one is almost guaranteed: people will come

together in the wake of disaster. While disasters can happen to individuals, the more memorable disasters occur in communities where friends, neighbors, and families are affected. People will remember the destruction and the pain, but people will also remember how – after the event – their families and neighbors came together to overcome. This is what CERT is all about.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area. Earthquakes and wildfires are the disasters that

most readily come to mind for Santa Cruz County, but they are not the only ones. If there is a disaster, professional responders (fire, police) may not be immediately available to help. CERT trains people in basic emergency response skills, such as fire safety, light building search and rescue, team organization, and disaster emergency medical operations. Using this training, CERT members can assist


others in their neighborhood or workplace until professional help arrives. Here in Seacliff is an active CERT Team which welcomes people to join Team Seacliff by completing a basic training class. The website <u>www.santacruzcountycert.org</u> allows one to sign up for CERT Basic Classes, and contains other useful information to help you, your family, and neighbors prepare for possible disasters.
