Review of a Challenging County Budget Zach Friend Second District Supervisor In late May and early June, the Board of Supervisors held budget hearings to review the elements of the over \$1 billion County budget. County departments presented their proposed programmatic investments, challenges surrounding the state budget that the County is deeply connected to, and

opportunities for the coming fiscal year. Over the last year, the County has maintained strong reserves and a top tier bond rating that helped provide some liquidity for the response to this year's storms. However, significant unreimbursed disaster costs, new state mandates, especially in the health and human services spaces, and potentially significant state budget cut, which may result in large cuts to counties, are all part of this coming year's budget reality.

What are the key accomplishments this year?

Starting with the good news, here are some highlights of the countywide accomplishments this year. We opened the new South County Government Center, which will provide a significant level of access to services for south county residents and also remove a number of cars from the road because many south county employees will be able to work from this new Watsonville location. The County's Housing Element was also certified, something communities throughout the state have struggled to achieve.

For behavioral health, significant investments were made in the development of the new Children's Crises Residential unit and a partnership for youth in crises services at Watsonville Hospital. To increase services and reduce homelessness, new navigation centers, with lower access barriers to finding permanent supportive housing, are being developed to make it easier to care for those in need. In our district, there were major investments in parks including a new baseball field Polo Grounds, Hidden Beach new restrooms coming soon, and the reimagining of Willowbrook Park honoring Sergeant Damon Gutzwiller.

The County recently reopened the Recovery Center, which provides a safe space and point of connection for residents who may be struggling with substance use disorder, while freeing up valuable public safety resources. The Sheriff's DNA Laboratory is also nearing completion and, once accredited and fully staffed, will help speed the delivery of justice for sexual assault survivors and others impacted by crime.



What are the major challenges facing the budget?

Two of the biggest challenges facing this year's budget are unreimbursed disaster costs and state mandates (on-going responsibilities with either one-time state funding or state funding cuts).

Unreimbursed Disaster Costs: The County faces stiff financial challenges due to storm repair costs from seven federally declared disasters since 2017, with \$144 million in unreimbursed costs that is roughly the equivalent of an entire year of General Fund property tax revenues. This has left the County with little capital to address new and emerging challenges and requires bonding (borrowing) an estimated \$85 million to maintain cash balances and assure the continuity of services to the community. One concern that was expressed during budget time was that this removes nearly all available funding for emerging road repairs and, in particular, future storm damage.

Behavioral Health Initiatives: In the coming year, the County will be implementing significant behavioral health initiatives and state-mandated changes. The Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Act and CalAIM, California's transformation of the Medi-Cal system, are two significant changes intended to provide help to individuals with behavioral health issues including substance use disorder.

In addition, the state has imposed a cap on the number of annual referrals a county may make to the Department of State Hospitals system for individuals charged with a felony but ruled Incompetent to Stand Trial. Proposition 1 will also bring new challenges, with Gov. Gavin Newsom promising an accelerated implementation of the significant changes included in that measure. Proposition 1 will have major impacts to the County's allocation of Mental Health Services Act funds with the County anticipating funding losses in key programs we currently provide.


State Budget Deficit: The recent updates by the Governor, Department of Finance and the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) show a remarkably challenging state budget deficit. Estimates average between \$50-60 billion with the LAO projecting a deficit of \$73 billion. Regardless of the ultimate number, there will be cuts to programs and services that the County provides. According to the state, the budget deficit is largely because of a decline in expected income tax revenues due to cuts in the tech industry and high-income earners. Given how dependent the state is on income tax revenues it's difficult to predict when revenues might rebound and, therefore, how long these cuts will impact us locally.

Mar Vista Bridge and Highway Construction Finally Begins!

Seacliff residents are very excited about installation of the new auxiliary lanes on Highway 1 and especially the construction of the Mar Vista Bridge. Those who planned and built the freeway in the 1940's and 50s probably didn't realize, at the time, how important a safe pedestrian passage across the freeway would be for our community. While we are grateful there is a sidewalk on the State Park Drive Overpass, the Mar Vista Bridge will create a safer and shorter route for more Seacliff residents to walk or bike to destinations including Mar Vista Elementary School, Cabrillo College and the Aptos Library. Parents in Seacliff can soon send their children to school more safely, without driving them there, taking more cars out of the morning commuter traffic. It will also reduce travel times for bus riders who will be able to walk over the bridge to the nearby bus stops on Soquel Drive.

We are grateful to everyone who labored for decades advocating for this vital connection including our County Supervisors, Ellen Pirie and Zach Friend, and the Aptos neighbors who participated in public meetings encouraging its construction, and the Santa Cruz Regional Transportation Commission staff who helped the agency seek and receive \$107 million award for the Highway 1 Bay and Porter to State Park Drive auxiliary lane, bus-on-shoulder improvements that also include the Mar Vista Bridge. We also appreciate the work and dedication of those involved in the planning and approval processes required to expand the Aptos section of the highway so daily commuters will see that staying on Highway 1 will be a better choice than clogging Seacliff residential roads that were not built for freeway traffic volumes. Finally, we are grateful for the Santa Cruz Regional Transportation Commission planner, Sarah Christensen, who spent several years on this project and always kept Seacliff neighbors apprised of the latest developments and sought our input in its design and aesthetic features.

Completion of the bridge will change our travel patterns, so the Soquel Drive safety and congestion mitigations, currently under construction, will hopefully improve the way for those traveling to and from the bridge along this busy road. Pedestrian improvements are also planned at the intersection of Mar Vista and McGregor Drives in Seacliff, making it safer for those traveling to the oceanside, including many beach walkers who will likely change their route, from the State Park Drive overpass to the Mar Vista Bridge to reach the beach.

Seacliff is full of pedestrians, cyclists, dog walkers and families who stroll and play in our streets. When we design infrastructure that make our residents a priority, we improve mobility and access for everyone and support our county's pedestrian safety goals. Building this bridge expands both accessibility and social connections, and creates happier neighborhoods.

RTC to Host Community Open Houses for Zero Emission Passenger Rail and Trail Project

The Santa Cruz County Regional Transportation Commission (RTC) is hosting two community open

houses to solicit the public's feedback on the next phase of development for the Zero Emission Passenger Rail and Trail Project. The project proposes new high-capacity passenger rail service and stations on approximately 22 miles of the Santa Cruz Branch Rail Line from the City of Santa Cruz through Seacliff to Pajaro, as well as 12 miles of Coastal Rail Trail from Rio Del Mar Boulevard through the community of La Selva Beach and the City of Watsonville.

Community members are invited to attend the upcoming in-person and virtual open houses to learn about proposed rail transit vehicle types and the initial conceptual alignment and share your input with RTC staff and consultants.
